Additionally, I've worked with Shane Tedder for several years, which keeps me in the loop about many of the wonderful sustainability-related initiatives happening

**Describe how your project relates to the three pillars of sustainability (environmental stewardship, economic equity, and social inclusion).:** The North American Association for Environmental Education's vision is a sustainable future for all where environmental and social responsibility drive individual and institutional choices. Their mission is to bring the brightest minds together to accelerate environmental literacy and civic engagement through the power of education. Participation in the conference would help our students to understand what this means and be part of the process.

You will likely want to copy and paste your response into the text box.: Students in NRE 360-001 (Environmental Commission) will all attend the 2019 North American Association for Environmental Education Conference in Lexington October 16-19. October 16 is pre-conference workshops and will be optional except for the opening reception in the evening – assuming there is funding for the event. Wednesday will also serve as an alternative day of participation for students who have weekend work obligations they cannot afford to miss or who have already arranged for travel home during fall break that prevents them from being at the conference on Saturday. October 17-19 includes speakers, concurrent and plenary sessions, events for young professionals, a poster session, an exhibit fair, and a 30 under 30 youth panel. Students will be expected to document and evaluate all the sessions and panels they attend. They also will be given a networking scavenger hunt of sorts to complete during the conference to encourage them to ask people about their work, career path and lessons learned along the way.

# Who will this project primarily impact?:

The Environmental Stewardship Fee is a \$4 per semester student tuition fee. Given that the SSC is in charge of distributing these funds, please describe your project's plan to maximize student impact.: Students will volunteer up to 10 hours each at the conference in order to earn a deeply discounted conference rate (free except meals). I was only able to secure enough volunteer spots for six free registrations, but this is still significant. The full rate for a student participant is \$455. The volunteer registration also doesn't cover any workshops students might wish to attend on Wednesday. To ensure students get the most out of the conference, there will be accountability for being engaged in the form of an assignment that focuses on session reflection and evaluation as well as networking.

People volunteering 10 hours get a free registration. There are 8 students in the course, but we were only able to secure enough slots for 66 hours of volunteer time - 6 free registrations. These registrations don't include meals, which is why I request funding for meals for six and full registration (student cost) for two people.
