










**Fighting fires, literally.** On Friday, April 24, Good Sam Maintenance Technician **Thomas Coward** was working on the ground floor of the hospital when a faulty light fixture in stairwell E caught fire, causing a Code Red alarm. Thomas immediately took stairwell A to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor and raced to stairwell E. When his supervisors arrived on the scene, he was in the stairwell with a fire extinguisher and had put out the fire. Thomas then directed his team to place wet towels at the base of patient room doors to keep smoke from entering the rooms. His quick reaction prevented the fire from spreading and kept more smoke from entering the hallways affecting patients and staff. If he had not responded so quickly, it is very likely we would have had to evacuate the patients on the 3rd floor hall and possibly the floors above. **GREAT JOB, Thomas and team!** 



UK Announces Start of Low Operational Activity/Administrative No-pay Plan as part of measures to address budget challenges caused by covid19. Facilities Management continues to provide critical services to the campus and is working closely with university Administration to adapt to the financial challenges we face. On Thursday, April 23, University of Kentucky officials announced changes for approximately 1,700 employees as part of the first phase of the plan. Approximately 1,500 of the full- and part-time employees work at UK HealthCare across the health care enterprise. Another 200 employees will be placed on low operational activity/administrative no-pay status from UK's dental clinics, which have been suspended in response to COVID-19, as well as Dining and Transportation Services. UK Gatton Student Center expansion gets underway. The University's Gatton Student Center was originally constructed in 1938 and the Alumni Gym in 1924. They were completely renovated and expanded in 2018 to more than 378,000 square feet. Earlier this spring, a second expansion of the facility was launched in response to the popularity of Champions Kitchen with students, staff, and employees. The \$25 million, three-story expansion will add 350 seats to Champions on the first floor and additional space for student support on the second and third floors. UK's Capital Projects Management is overseeing the work, led by project manager Scotty Bowles. The project was made possible by an incredibly generous gift from William "Bill" Gatton and funding support from the University's dining partner. The project should be complete by the fall of 2021.



Power outage scheduled for South Limestone (PS5) Garage on 4.29.2020. An electrical power outage is scheduled for the University of Kentucky's South Limestone Garage (PS #5) from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 29. This planned outage is associated with the expansion project and will enable contractors to connect new electrical service to the structure. Gates to the garage will be up that day and while the structure should have ample natural light for parking purposes, the elevators will not be in operation during this time.



Strategic reassignments help us meet our mission during massive shift in campus operations. The University's move to online instruction to protect the health of our campus and community reduced (almost overnight) the number of daily visitors to our campus by more than 30,000. This abrupt shift did not change the square footage of buildings we heat, cool, power and maintain or the acres of grounds and thousands of plants we tend, but it has required us to evaluate how and where our talented staff are deployed. The reduction in campus visitors makes some projects such as renovation, construction, and utility upgrades, less complicated to implement. This week, as part of our ongoing efforts to maximize these opportunities, five employees from FM's Maintenance and Operations teams will be assisting Utilities and Energy Management's distribution team. Innovation, initiative, efficiency, and collaboration have always been critical to our success in Facilities and they are even more important as we find balance in the fluid conditions resulting from our collective efforts to protect the health of our community. Rodney Moberly, UK Grounds Team Lead, provided a perfect example of this approach earlier this week. UK Grounds has needed gravel at their greenhouse to cover a heavily used area that was often muddy and difficult to navigate. Rodney observed a milling and paving job taking place at the corner of University and Cooper Drives and spotted an opportunity to turn the waste from one project into a resource for another. He approached the contractor and partnered with them to have the milled pavement dumped at the greenhouse so Grounds could use it instead of buying gravel.




**UK Recycling** has championed UK's effort to reduce waste through closed-loop systems for materials management for decades. This spring, UK Recycling's **Esther Moberly and Joanna Ashford** partnered with their student interns, **Sophie Beavin** (2020) and **Antonio Zizzo** (2021) to provide the campus community with an innovative resource: A set of virtual guides for repairing common items instead of throwing them out. Originally planned as a campus *Fix-It Festival*, the team adapted and innovated to create online guides when the global pandemic caused the cancellation of all campus events. #### Way Back Wednesday – Stoll Field

You probably know Stoll Field, but do you know McClean Stadium? Until 1972, on either side of Stoll Field were two concrete grandstands that comprised "McLean Stadium", home to the football Wildcats. The stadium was named for Price Innes McLean, center on the 1923 Wildcat football team who died on Sunday, October 8, 1923, "of injuries received in the hard-fought battle with the University of Cincinnati." At the time, both the field and the stadium were named for Judge Richard Stoll, a Lexington attorney and UK Board Member. Following McClean's death, a group of students and friends petitioned the University to rename the stadium in his honor.



#### **Facilities Fact: Demolition Debris**

More than 70% of the debris from recent demolition projects was recycled. Projects, such as the current demolition of the Kirwan Blanding Complex, generate a tremendous amount of material that must be removed from the site. UK Capital Projects Management works with our contractors to minimize the amount that ends up in a landfill.

#### A message from President Capilouto about State Budget

Governor Beshear's administration recently asked all executive branch cabinets and agencies (includes public universities) to prepare 1 percent budget reduction plans for the balance of this fiscal year. For UK, this means a reduction of approximately \$2.6 million in our state appropriation. Such a reduction is even more painful because it has to occur between now and June 30 – a period of two months – rather than being spread out over the course of a full year. Our plan to meet this reduction is to use existing revenues and fund sources, rather than cut programs or critical initiatives at this late point in the year.

UK HealthCare, working with UK Recycling, diverted over 31,000lbs of used medical equipment last year through their partner with equipment provide Stryker. Keep up the good work!







Way Back Wednesday – Holmes Hall. This four–story dormitory, built in 1956 to house 300 female students, was constructed on the corner of South Limestone Street and Avenue of Champions for a cost of \$1.1 million. It was designed by Ernst Johnson, UK's Architect from 1938-1950, one of the 18 buildings he designed. Holmes Hall was named in honor of Sarah Bennet Holmes, UK's Dean of Women in the 1940s, who tirelessly championed the rights of women throughout her career. She served during another tumultuous time in our history, that included the Great Depression and WWII. The original Holmes Hall was demolished in 2014 and a new residence hall was rededicated in her honor in 2016.

UK uses central utility plants to provide steam and chilled water to heat and cool our facilities. Natural gas and coal-fired boilers are used to produce the steam. Evaporative cooling towers, powered by electricity, are used to produce the chilled water. These utilities are delivered through many miles of underground piping. This district approach to heating and cooling has many benefits including efficiency and redundancy.







Mark Wiggam, is Planning, Design, and Construction's project manager for the renovation of the Environmental Quality Management Center (EQMC). The renovation will provide UK EQM with much needed office space and a new conference room. The mission of UK's Environmental Quality Department is to provide outstanding service to the research, academic, operational, and healthcare of the University in defining and achieving their goals for environmental compliance and resource conservation.

The University has taken steps to prevent budgeted reduction in force. Facing more than a \$70 million shortfall, the University planned for deeper cuts to create an \$11 million contingency fund that would allow us to confront the inherent economic uncertainty created by the pandemic. Given the state of the economy in Fayette County and the Commonwealth – and our desire to protect our greatest asset, our people – President Capilouto announced on Friday that he had directed that a portion of the contingency funds be used to ensure that there are no reductions in force as part of our budget. That will save about 100 jobs, jobs that are vital to our work and critical to the economy of Fayette County and the region. UK is approximately 14 percent of the employee base in this county. We represent approximately 18 percent of the county's payroll – the source for most of the funding for essential government services and public safety. It is not an exaggeration to suggest that our work – and our employee base – is sustaining Lexington's economy as the richness of our community sustains us.




Last week, Med Center Facilities team, led by Planning Design and Construction Manager Tina Arthur, assisted UK HealthCare with the installation of a new **neurointerventional biplane**. The piece of equipment is specifically designed for the diagnosis and treatment of neurological disorders, such as stroke and brain aneurysms. It has two-dimensional and three-dimensional capabilities that allow the neuroradiologist to view the brain, arteries and spine with one single injection of X-ray dye. The project had the potential to cause significant disruption to the KY Children's Hospital (KCH), but our teams worked with UKHC and our contractors to "think outside the box" and find innovative solutions for this project, effectively eliminating any disturbance to KCH. It took working late nights into early mornings to create a pathway IN the concrete floor to deliver the infrastructure needed to support this equipment. Crews came in at 3 am to pour structural grout, using 1" pours to obtain necessary strength for the floor. Our team completed this complex project in record time and under budget. Great job to all involved!


