



Due to Covid-19 and touchless safety practices, the ADA door opener posts at UK Gatton Student Center and other campus locations, are now a high demand piece of equipment for students and faculty. The added frequency of pushes to the post, often by feet and elbows, have caused many to become wobbly and unstable. Area 1 Maintenance Techs, **Ryan Dennis** and **Riley Cobb** (not pictured), conducted an inspection of all ADA door posts at the Gatton Student Center and secured all loose ones by retightening anchor pins and mount bolts. UK purchases nearly all of its electricity from Kentucky Utilities and this critical resource is delivered to the campus at three electrical substations. Last night, UK students, faculty, and staff attended a vigil for former UK student Breonna Taylor. Attendees of the vigil participated in a short procession across the campus, a moment of silence at the Wildcat Alumni Plaza, and listened to comments from fellow students about how Breonna's death and the investigation that followed had impacted them. Student organizers indicated that they intend to participate in daily vigils in the coming weeks.
