Kentucky Proud Park, the homefield for UK Athletics' Baseball program, has earned LEED certification status from the US Green Building Council. Our campus now has more than 25 buildings that have earned some level of certification from this USGBC program. This status is earned through points awarded for design, construction and performance relative to energy, occupant health, and several categories of environmental stewardship. The construction of Kentucky Proud Park was managed by **Keith Ingram, Capital Projects Management.** Ross Tarrant was our design firm for this project and they noted that this was an especially notable accomplishment for an open air stadium.





June 22-26 is *Animal Rights Awareness Week*. To celebrate, we will feature pictures and stories about campus wildlife each day this week. Today's wildlife spotting (and relocation) is North America's only marsupial (pouched mammal), the Virginia opossum (*Didelphis virginiana*). The Opossum is commonly, though incorrectly, referred to as a possum. A possum (minus the "O") is also a marsupial but it is found in Australia and is more closely related to kangaroos. The Opossum has a hairless prehensile tail used for hanging from trees. They are nocturnal and have 50 teeth, more than any other land animal in North America.
