

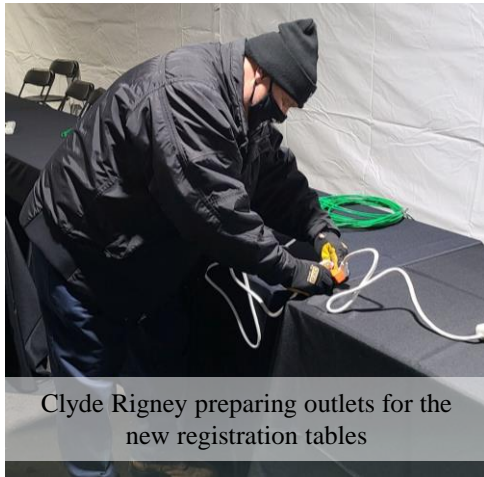

UK Facilities Management plays a critical role in the efforts to provide testing and vaccine to our community by supporting the temporary facilities at Kroger Field. Last week, the vaccine clinic at the stadium nearly doubled in size with the addition of two new 20' x 80' tents: one for registration and one for a post-shot waiting area. Inside the Field Players Club, more shot stations have been added to help get the vaccine into peoples arms a lot quicker. Our dedicated employees lead by **Area Manager John Gambill** have been involved with the setup and logistics of these new tents. Heating the tents has been a huge challenge, and the heaters that were brought in, require a tremendous amount of power. Our electricians had to run cable, install new breakers, and outlet boxes throughout the new site. All the registration stations required individual outlets,

and all the new IT had to have power. And of course, all this work had to do be done, in the middle of an ice storm last week.
