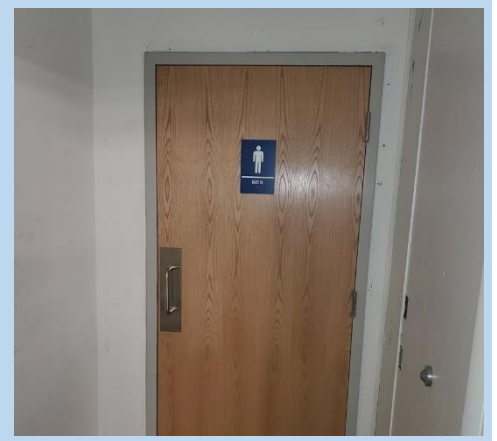

Wayback Wednesday – Lafferty Hall

Lafferty Hall (left) was constructed in the late 1930s as UK’s first Law building. The Kentucky Student Bar association poses on the front steps in 1949 (below right). The building was one of 12 designed by Lexington architect and UK Educator, Ernst V. Johnson. Johnson’s other notable buildings include the old Student Center (1937), Funkhouser (1940), the Fine Arts Building (1950), and Memorial Coliseum (1950). His signature, innovative brickwork is evident on each of these buildings. Today, the building is home to the Anthropology Department and the William S. Webb Museum of Anthropology.
