**FM Electrician Pat McAlister** recently noticed water in the electric room of Singletary Center (left) and sent Area 1 staff to investigate the source. Area 1 techs **Clyde Durham, Dorian Shelton**, and **Jefferson Wilham** did an excellent

job finding, responding, and communicating quickly that the cause was a steam condensate leak in the utility tunnel under the sidewalk near the wildcat statue (right). The condensate flowed downhill from there to a high voltage vault feeding Singletary. The hot condensate water burned out the sump pump and filled the vault to the lid. It then tracked through the high voltage conduits feeding the Singletary switch gear. If left unnoticed and unaddressed the situation could have resulted in a major power outage. Utilities has pumped out the manhole and are working on repairing the line. Good job to all involved! – By Krishna Hobbs





Yesterday, UK Grounds Arboriculture team addressed a potential safety issue by removing dead wood from a pin oak in the W.T. Young parking lot. The tree's health is slowly declining due to multiple factors including root and soil volume loss, previous droughts and storms. Jason Swartz, UK's Arborist Lead, observed the condition of the upper canopy (left) and determined that it required immediate attention. The team worked with Transportation Services to close adjacent parking spaces which allowed for space to set up their equipment and safely perform the work.
