

Wayback Wednesday - The Maxwell Place Garage

As the historical plaque at left notes, students used to live in the attic above the garage at Maxwell Place, the home of UK Presidents since 1917. Terry Birdwhistle, former dean of UK Libraries, recently told the story of one of those students, Clifford Amos: "A first generation college student, he had grown up in a coal camp and began college at UK with no more than a few dollars in his pocket. One November afternoon in 1938, while walking along Limestone Street near the campus, Clifford fainted on the sidewalk, a result of hunger and exhaustion. UK's first lady Frances Jewell McVey, heard about Clifford's misfortune and immediately sent word for Clifford to meet with her at Maxwell Place. After some conversation, McVey offered Clifford a place to live on the second floor of the garage in back of Maxwell Place to save money. Three other boys already lived there. Clifford's only payment for his room was to do a few chores each month."





On Monday morning this Eastern Whip-poor-will, a member of the nightjar family, was discovered trapped in the new Cornerstone Parking Garage Stairwell. Thanks to the quick and compassionate work of **Shaun Barnes** (**Trucking**) and **Brett Long** (**Grounds**), the bird was rescued and released to fly another day. These birds have been made famous in folk songs, poems, and literature for their endless chanting of their names on summer nights. Eastern Whip-poor-wills are often heard but seldom seen.

WHAT IS COMMUNITY SUPPORTED AGRICULTURE?

CSA farmers offer a limited number of their produce shares for anyone in their local area to purchase in advance. When you purchase a share from a farm, you become a CSA member of that farm. A CSA membership through UK includes a box of local and organic vegetables (and occasionally fruits and other farm products) delivered weekly to a convenient pickup location.
