### Way (way) Back Wednesday: The Whitfield Stump

The "Whitfield" stump is a 300-million-year-old natural 'cast' of the stump of a fern-like tree called a Lycopod. The cast formed when sand filled in the hole left by a decayed stump and its roots. Lycopods were the most common trees in the coal-forming swamp forests of the Pennsylvanian Period. Their fossils are commonly found in both of Kentucky's coal fields. The stump was discovered when it dropped from the roof of the Clover Fork Coal

Co. in Kitts, KY. The fossil was given the University by George Whitfield, manager of the coal company, in 1961 (left). In 2017, the stump was moved from the lawn of Whitehall to the Mining and Minerals Resources Building (right).








Did you know that UK Facilities Management Grounds Department includes a professional arborist team that is responsible for the care of the more than 14,000 trees? Over the past few years, this team has built up the equipment needed to manage of our campus forest with the safety of our community and health of the trees as top priorities. With this many trees, and the growth of the campus, it is inevitable that sometimes trees die, are

damaged, or have to be removed. Last year, the team added a portable sawmill to their arsenal which allows trees that have to be removed to be milled onsite into lumber that can be made available for campus projects (left). The live edge oak benches in the Gatton Student Center (right) were the first example of the reuse of lumber from campus trees, although these were milled at the UK Wood Utilization Center.
