## Student Membership

#### At Large Member

What: An individual member of the SSC

How: submit a cover letter and resume

When: Applications accepted in late fall and late spring

Responsibilities: Attend bi-weekly meetings, participate in discussion on project

proposals, vote on projects

What makes a strong application? Consider answering these questions in the application:

- 1. Why do you want to be on the SSC?
- 2. What unique insights could you bring?
- 3. What experience and education do you have that would make you a good addition?

#### Organization Representative

<u>What</u>: A representative from a sustainability related student organization

<u>How</u>: Organization submits an application from our website

<u>When</u>: Applications in late spring

<u>Responsibilities</u>: One representative attends bi-weekly meetings, participate in discussion on project proposals, vote on projects

What makes a strong application? Consider the following questions when developing your application:

- 1. How does your organization relate to the three pillars of sustainability?
- 2. How does the organization identify with the SSC's mission?

## Project Idea Development

#### **Students: Idea Development Process**

- 1. What are you passionate about?
- 2. Relate the project to UK:
  - a. Is there something missing?
  - b. Is there something needed?
  - c. Want to create a piece of technology?
  - d. Does there need to be community education?
  - e. Want to increase awareness?
- 3. Analyze your Idea:
  - a. How will this project advance sustainability?
  - b. What are its strengths?
  - c. How could it improve?
  - d. Who are the stakeholders and who needs to be involved?
- 4. Implementing the Idea:
  - a. Do you need a faculty/staff advisor?
  - b. Create a budget

#### Faculty/Staff: Project Development Process

- 1. Questions to Consider
  - a. What sustainability topic needs to be addressed?
  - b. Is there something lacking in your department?
  - c. Is there another department you can collaborate with?
  - d. How can you maximize student impact?
- 2. Leverage Other Funding Sources
- 3. Project Examples
  - a. Student Interns/Assistants
  - b. Research supplies and implementation
  - c. Survey Incentives
  - d. New Programming

## Writing a Strong SSC Proposal

#### **Writing the Proposal**

- 1. Apply online using our application webform
- 2. Clearly explain the relation to the 3 Pillars of Sustainability
- 3. Clearly emphasize student impact
- 4. Be clear and concise!

#### Logistics

- 1. Create a thorough budget
- 2. There can be no retroactive funding
- 3. Funding requirements:
  - a. For projects below \$1,000, no matching is required
  - b. For projects ranging between \$1,000 and \$4,999, in its second year, 25% of project must be funded by an alternate source
  - c. For projects priced \$5,000 and above, in its first year, 25% of the projects cost should be sought (but not necessarily attained)
  - d. For full funding requirements, see <u>here</u>

#### **Presentation**

- 1.10 minute presentation, 5 minute Q&A
- 2. Make it interesting and persuasive
- 3. This is the last impression before the Council votes

#### **How to Stand Out**

- 1. Seek out additional funds
- 2. Interdisciplanary teams, partnerships, and collaborations are viewed positively
- 3. Provide letters of support
- 4. If relevant, have relevant graphics/flyers included
